As we begin a new year, I want to remind our members of several important events that help shape the future of 4 Rivers Electric Cooperative. ▶ If an outage occurs, stay clear of any downed power lines and treat all lines

- as if they are energized. Report outages immediately in the SmartHub app or call 620-364-2116.
- If you use a generator, be sure it operates outdoors and away from vents or windows to prevent carbon monoxide buildup.

- ▶ For those relying on space heaters, keep them at least 3 feet from curtains, bedding or furniture, and plug them directly into a wall outlet never into an extension cord or power strip.
- Now is also a good time to test your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors and replace batteries if needed. Insulating exposed pipes, sealing drafts, and checking your home's weatherproofing can reduce energy use and prevent cold-weather damage.
- ► When driving after storms, please watch for crews working along roadways and give them room to work safely. Winter brings its challenges, but it also

highlights the strength and resilience of the rural communities we serve. Thank you for your continued support of 4 Rivers, and for doing your part to stay safe and prepared. I look forward to a productive and positive year together.

Need Help With Winter Heating Bills?

LIEAP Applications Open Jan. 20-March 31

Winter energy costs can put extra strain on many Kansas households, but help is available. The Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) provides a one-time annual benefit to help eligible households with home heating expenses.

WHAT IS LIEAP?

LIEAP is a federally funded program that assists qualifying households with a portion of their home heating costs. Benefits vary based on income, number of people in the home, type of dwelling, and the primary heating source.

This is not a loan — it's assistance designed to help families manage the cost of winter energy use.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

A household may qualify if:

- ▶ An adult living at the residence is personally responsible for paying the heating bill (whether to a utility, fuel provider or landlord).
- ▶ The gross household income is at or below 150% of the federal poverty level. See chart at right for 2026 income eligibility guidelines.

HOW TO APPLY

LIEAP applications will be accepted from Jan. 20 until 5 p.m., March 31, 2026. You can apply:

- ► Through the Kansas DCF Self-Service Portal at www.dcf.ks.gov.
- ▶ By paper application, available through local Kansas DCF offices.
- ▶ By requesting a mailed copy if internet access is limited.

BE PREPARED TO PROVIDE:

- ▶ Proof of income for all adults in the household.
- ► Copies of recent heating bills or fuel receipts.
- ► A rental agreement if heat is included in rent.
- ► Signatures from all adult household members.

NOTE: You must reapply each year

unless you qualify for DCF's three-year eligibility option.

Understanding the Power Behind Your Power

Winter Lessons From Our Lineworkers

When you flip a switch on a cold January morning, it's easy to forget what's happening behind the scenes to keep that light on. Substations, transformers and miles of power lines all work together to deliver reliable electricity to your home. But in winter, when freezing temperatures, ice and wind push our system to its limits, the real power behind your power comes down to people.

Our 4 Rivers lineworkers are trained to work safely and efficiently in all conditions — often in the coldest, darkest hours — to inspect equipment, repair outages and restore service. Their work is demanding, precise and sometimes dangerous, especially when the weather turns harsh. Yet they show up every time, because keeping your family safe and warm is what cooperative service is all about.

This winter, we invite you to take a lesson from the people who brave the elements to keep our communities running. Whether you're working outside, enjoying winter recreation or simply trying to stay safe as temperatures drop, the same principles that guide our crews can help protect you too.

WHAT WE LEARN FROM **LINEWORKERS: STAYING SAFE** IN THE COLD

WATCH THE WEATHER. Before every job, our crews monitor wind chill, snow, ice accumulation and storm fronts. You should too. Cold stress can creep in quickly, even during short

periods outdoors. Take frequent breaks inside to warm up, and plan your time outside around changing conditions.

DRESS THE PART. Lineworkers rely on layered clothing to stay warm, dry and safe. You can do the same. Wear moisture-wicking base layers. Add insulating mid-layers. Top with a wind- and water-resistant outer shell. Keep socks dry and choose waterproof boots. If clothing becomes wet, replace it immediately. Even light moisture increases the risk of frostbite.

PROTECT YOUR HEAD, FACE AND HANDS. Extremities are the first to lose heat and the first to suffer frostbite. Our crews use specialized hardhat liners, balaclavas and insulated gloves designed for electrical safety. While most people don't need voltage-rated protective equipment, you should still wear a warm hat or hood, protect your face in high winds, and use insulated gloves or mittens outdoors.

FUEL UP AND STAY HYDRATED. Cold weather takes more energy than you think. Lineworkers stay fueled with warm fluids and high-energy foods throughout long shifts. We should do the same when spending extended time in the cold.

KNOW THE WARNING SIGNS. Even trained professionals stay vigilant for symptoms of frostbite and hypothermia — and you should, too. If you notice these symptoms, move to warmth immediately. Severe cases require medical attention.

► SIGNS OF FROSTBITE

- Numbness or tingling
- ▶ Skin turning red, white or bluish-gray
- ► Hard, waxy or cold skin
- ► Stiff joints

SIGNS OF HYPOTHERMIA

- ▶ Shivering
- ► Confusion or slurred speech
- Drowsiness
- Slow, shallow breathing

BE PREPARED ON THE ROAD. Crews equip their trucks for winter emergencies. You should equip your vehicle as well. Having the right tools on hand can make all the difference in an unexpected situation. Include:

- ▶ Blankets
- ▶ Phone chargers
- ► Traction aids
- ► Snacks and
- ► Flashlights
- bottled water

WHY THIS MATTERS: THE HUMAN SIDE OF THE GRID

When frigid temperatures hit, lineworkers suit up, gear up and head out so that others can have heat, light and safety. Their work reminds us that winter demands preparation, awareness and respect for the elements. By following the same cold-weather safety steps our lineworkers practice every day, you can help protect yourself, your family and your neighbors this winter.

The power behind your power isn't just about substations and circuits — it's about people, community and the cooperative spirit that keeps us all connected.
